Our Emmanuel Family has reached out to touch the hearts of a group of wonderful souls. Our Christmas outreach to the residents of Mountainside Senior Living through our Angel Tree program has generated an overwhelming response as reported by their Activities Manager, Penny Goldman.

Ms. Goldman reported to us just a few of the responses from the residents when they opened the gifts you provided. She stated, "One man said he hadn't received gifts like that in 60 years – in fact, he was moved to tears. Another (who never participates in activities or parties) said he hadn't had a Christmas like this since he was a kid. One of our ladies (whose gifts I delivered after the party) was in her room going through one of her gift bags. I brought in the rest of it, and she whispered, 'Are you sure these are for me? There is so much. I don't know what to say!' She got teary, which got ME teary, and we shared a hug, kiss, and a Merry Christmas."

Her story goes on with, "One fellow, who really needed some clothes, couldn't wait to tell me this morning that he got everything he wanted and needed. He couldn't imagine how someone knew just what those things were."

Rector's Reflections

What will Emmanuel's story be in 2015? What role will you play?

Our 2015 pledge campaign is well on its way to being the best ever. (We are not quite there yet – we still need to hear from about 20% of our pledgers – so if you are in that group, please submit your pledge as soon as possible, and please be as generous as you can.) But finances are only part of the story. Even more important are how we spend our *selves* – our time and our talents, our gifts and abilities.

At each baptismal liturgy, we all promise, with God's help, to "continue

in the apostles' teaching and fellowship, in the breaking of bread, and in the prayers" and to "seek and serve Christ in all persons," loving our neighbors as ourselves. Some ministries focus inwards, on our worship and our church family. Some ministries and missions focus outward, carrying the Good News to the world around us. There is a role to play for everyone. How will you take part in 2015?

Worship and formation on Sunday calls on the abilities and contributions of an impressive list of participants: greeters, altar guild and ushers, nursery attendants and coffee hour hosts, Children's Chapel leaders, flower guild, Sunday School teachers, youth group leaders, and adult formation teachers, acolytes, Eucharistic ministers, lectors, intercessors, our choir, and greeters, and more. Once a month, others host our FIRE program – fellowship, intergenerational religious education, and worship on Saturday nights.

Behind the scenes, counters help account for offerings. Another volunteer regularly collates and folds our worship bulletins. Several groups help plan the formation programs and coordinate worship ministries. Our buildings and grounds committee helps keep our physical plant ready to support all of this. A cemetery committee keeps records of that part of our grounds. Others follow up with newcomers, visit shut-ins, and take Holy Communion those who can't come to church.

Throughout the week, Emmanuel *Connections* helps volunteers connect with those who need help, and helps those who need help find it. Two women's Bible study groups meet. We host two recovery groups (a third is on the way) and a Brownie Girl Scout troop. Parishioners knit prayer shawls as a tangible expression of our love for those who are ill. Others take meals to those who need a little help, and help plan our parish retreat at Shrine Mont.

We support a number of mission partners outside of our own congregation. Many parishioners help out with Bread Fund, packing food or giving out food parcels at Holy Cross Church, Batesville. Others are

regulars in the Disciples Kitchen feeding ministries in Waynesboro, volunteer at the Mountainside Senior Living Center Tea Party every other week, or at the new Mountainside Men's Movie group (do you like westerns?).

Our Endowment Board administers the proceeds from our endowment, and last year gave away over \$100,000 (None of our endowment proceeds are used for operating expenses; all are given away, as stipulated by our donors). These mission partners want our hands-on involvement. So consider helping out with the Albemarle Housing Improvement Program, the Alliance for Interfaith Ministries, Brownsville Elective Education, Camp Holiday Trails, Casa de Amistad, The Haven, Elk Hill Farm, Habitat for Humanity, Hospice of the Piedmont, Jefferson Area Board for the Aging, Meals on Wheels, Ministry with the Aging, the Senior Center, or Service Dogs of Virginia. If you want to travel, consider our international mission partners in Haiti, El Hogar's ministries in Honduras, or Emanuel Youth Mission in Taura, El Salvador (despite the similar name, it's an independent ministry).

What other ways to serve are on your heart? All of the ministries and missions listed above got started because someone in the parish cared enough to get involved and make a difference. Have a new idea? We can help you make it a reality. I know that parishioners are interested in a men's group and a chapter of Daughters of the King (a women's devotional and service organization), for example.

All of these ministries welcome your involvement. If you are looking for a way to "walk in love, as Christ loved us," contact me. I will be happy to connect you, make introductions, and generally get you started. Our ministries and our missions need your active participation. Let 2015 be the year you try something new. What role will you play in 2015?

Dear Members of Emmanuel,

It has been a pleasure and blessing for Joel and me to be part of the Emmanuel community. Over the last two months, I spent significant time praying about what God was calling me to do at this point in my ministry and what I thought was best for the parish.

In October, my doctoral committee approved a timeline for me to graduate in May 2016. Education Report

The Adult Formation Committee met in December. Exciting topics are in the works for the new year. Here is a sneak preview:

For Epiphany:

- **Cafe Emmanuel:** will carry on in the Parish Hall at 10am. For those new to Emmanuel, Cafe Emmanuel is our “coffee hour” with a twist; shortly after 10am, we ring the bell, welcome everyone, and pose a question about the Bible, spirituality, your favorite church memories, and other topics. We discuss the answers in small groups for a while, then share in a large group if we wish. It’s great way to learn more about Emmanuel people!
- **Bible and Theology:** *But solid food is for the mature, for those who have their powers of discernment trained by constant practice to distinguish good from evil. (Hebrews 5:14 ESV).* This class (Bible and Theology) is intended to be an ongoing class in the thought of the classic Christian intellectual tradition. It will vary between different books of the Bible and different Christian thinkers, and is intended to provide a space for substantive and cumulative training in how to think as a Christian. We will begin with the earliest Gospel, Mark. Meet in Ledford House, led by David Barrett-Johnson & Father Christopher.
- **Dreams of the Bible and our own:** Walter Brueggemann wrote, “The ancient world and the biblical tradition knew about dreams. The ancients understood that the unbidden communication

in the night opens sleepers to a world different from the one they manage during the day. The ancients dared to imagine, moreover, that this unbidden communication is one venue in which the holy purposes of God, perplexing and unreasonable as they might be, come to us.” We will review some of the dreams of the Bible, outline ways in which we can have access to our own dreams, and note some ways of finding meaning in them. Meet in Ledford House, led by Julie Shields.

For Lent:

- **Cafe Emmanuel** will carry on!
- **Bible and Theology** will be offered on a continual basis.
- **The Christ Walk Sessions** are adapted from Anna Fitch Courie's Christ Walk: A 40-Day Spiritual Fitness Program - a 40 day mind, body and spiritual wellness program for Lent. Walking is a very holy activity that almost anyone can do at any fitness level. We will meet in fellowship and concentrate on a different aspect of mind, body and spiritual health throughout Lent. The book is a great resource, but it is not necessary for participating! These sessions will start on the Sunday BEFORE Lent starts -15 February so that those people that want to start on Ash Wednesday may do so. Meet in Ledford House, led by M-E Via and Kimberlee Barrett-Johnson.
